## **Contra Dancing in Fiction**

Whirligig, by Paul Flieschman, is a sad but ultimately hopeful young-adult novel, in which a young man makes a journey of redemption. Near the end, he hears music coming from a nearby hall and goes to see what it is.

. . . Across the street, cars were parking and people walking into the Town Hall. He drifted out, heard music, and followed the others as if under hypnosis.

A pianist was pounding out chords on a stage, surrounded by a fiddler, a flutist, and a woman plucking a stand-up bass. Beside them, a gangling man was calling out steps to the two rows of dancers below. The music was brisk, bouncy and infections. Brent watched inconspicuously, leaning against the wall. Except for a few teenagers, the hall resembled a reunion of some sixties commune, with plenty of beards and ponytails in view. The caller's promptings, like an auctioneer's spiel, seemed almost to be in a foreign language.

"Allemand left. Now ladies' chain. Left-hand star. Back to the right. Actives down and back. Cast off. Everybody swing!"

Couples turned in circles, skirts rippling. Brent stared. It was a human whirligig, set in motion by music instead of wind. He sank into a chair and watched dance after dance. Suddenly, a young woman rushed up to him. "We need one more couple." She held out her hands.

To his great amazement, he agreed. A few people clapped when he got to his feet. As before, the caller walked them through the dance slowly, without any music. Brent now recognized some of the steps. Knowing hands turned him left instead of right and pointed him toward the proper partner. Then the music started up at full speed and the dancers, like clock parts, began to turn. Arms reached for his. Faces whizzed past. He was instantly enmeshed with the others. Wordlessly they corrected him, adjusted his grip, smiled at him. He'd always been gawky. This hadn't changed. But the pattern of steps, repeated over and over, slowly began to sink in. The galloping tune had an Irish feel. It was exalting to be part of the twining and twirling, and strangely thrilling to touch other hands and to feel them grasping his. He felt like a bee returning to a hive, greeted and accepted by all. He clapped with the others when the music stopped, stood outside to cool off, and was promptly asked if he wanted to do the next one. His partner called the event a "contradance." It felt to Brent like his rite of reentry. He stayed all the way to the waltz at the end.

### From the President



The good news this spring is that we're getting more young people involved in BACDS activities. This is what we need to fulfill our mission of promoting, preserving, performing, and teaching traditional English and American music and dance. We've been working hard to pass the torch to the next generation, and now the next generation is reaching out to take it.

On April 8, we hosted a meeting with Ethan Hazzard-Watkins, the Youth Projects Intern at the Country Dance and Song Society (our national umbrella organization). Ethan ran a spirited

brainstorming session involving people from all over the dance community from Fresno to the North Bay and Santa Cruz, including representatives from the Berkeley Folk Dancers and the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society. There were lots of good ideas, some of them new even to those of us who'd done this kind of brainstorming before. And we all made new contacts that will help us move things forward.

Later in April, we sponsored the *Contra Plus!* dance organized by Bob Carragher, Graham Waldon, and Lacey Waldon. This was a mix of contra and couple dances, to the fabulous music of a band organized by Jim Oakden. It brought in over 50% more people than a regular Palo Alto contra, and might have brought in more if there hadn't been competition from the Oakland Free Dance Festival, and a big Gaskell's dance that same evening. The mixed format pleased some and disappointed others, as expected. For the most part, it was a success, and shows that we need tinker more with new ideas to find the ones that work best. Bob, Graham, and Lacey are thinking about trying again, and I encourage others to get involved.

Our home-grown youth scholarship program was an even bigger success at Spring Dance Weekend than it was at Fall Frolick. We collected more donations for the program than needed to fund the young people who attended, and the young people pitched in and really raised the camp experience to a new level. We expect to continue this program in coming years.

Youth attendance continues to build at our dances. Both Berkeley and Palo Alto are building a strong group of young dancers. And at this year's Board Elections, we welcomed two Board members from the younger generation, Cory Rundle and Mary Hill.

As you can read elsewhere, some of our older leadership is ready to step aside. We want to thank Judy Rose Dornbush and Joyce Cooper for creating American Dance and Music Week, and running it successfully for six years, and Robin Cohen for her eight-year tenure as manager of Spring Dance Weekend. This is another wonderful chance for more young people to step forward into leadership positions. Joining (or even leading or organizing) a camp or event committee is a wonderful experience. Sure, you have to give up a little of your spare time and energy to attend meetings, make phone calls, and doing the necessary tasks, but you also build closer bonds with a small group of people working on the same goal; you learn new skills; you get to contribute your own ideas; and you don't have to do it by yourself, because there are other people working with you.

We didn't sponsor our own National Dance Week program this year. Instead we joined with Scott Gamble's mini Oakland Dance Festival on April 26. We did a Contra workshop and an English workshop and had some good opportunities to pass out publicity flyers.

Financially, we're riding out the recession like everyone else. Dance attendance is up slightly this year. So are hall rents, so we're not out of the woods. The good news is that our summer camps seem to be filling up. English Week is full, American Week is a little behind last year in sign-ups, but not worried. Family Week just needs 3 or 4 more families to break even (more *youth!*). Keep bringing your friends to dance.
