Once again, the Bay Area Country Dance Society's American Dance and Music Week will come alive at the magnificent Mendocino Woodlands Camp, a National Historic Landmark near the coastal village of Mendocino, a four-hour drive north of San Francisco. Cis Hinkle (GA) delights contra and square dancers with her skilled teaching, welcoming manner, playful enthusiasm, and masterful selection of dances. When not on the road in the USA, England or Denmark, or coordinating the Augusta Heritage Workshop in West Virginia, she teaches Tai Chi in her native town, Atlanta.

Whether you learn by ear or notation, bring your instruments and voice to participate in focused music workshops all day long, or kick back and join a like-minded pick-up group. Both daily classes and special one-time sessions will be happening.

George Paul, "The King of Contra Funk," will deepen your Keyboard Connections, exploring easy and accessible techniques and adding spice to your playing.

Strum-a-Little, Flat-Pick-a-Little: Owen Morrison will focus on how to make different accompaniment styles danceable an will offer efficient techniques for both lead and rhythm guitar

Sharing tunes in parallel with Owen's guitar workshop and aiming for great jamming opportunities later in the week, Ethan Hazzard-Watkins will offer Tips on Top Fiddling.

Join George to coral those random notes, funky rhythms, and harmonies-in-your-head and Write that Tune! Your composition will be transcribed to share with your bandmates and bring into your home community.

Band Together with Stuart Kenney who will lead an ensemble of musicians of all skill levels into the heart of contra dance music.

Wrapping West African-based rhythms with his own unique percussive style, Jubal Creech will tap the Contra Beat concentrating on the 'feel' of traditional tunes and inspiring collaboration within a dance band.

For those interested in pumping out familiar tunes or sharing new ones, look out for Given Harrison's spontaneous Jam-O-Rama, occurring at different times during each day.

Registration

The full fee of \$830 includes room, boards and tuition. All applications must be accompanied by a minimum \$150 deposit and will be considered in order of receipt. Final payment is due by June 5. Registration after June 25 must be paid-in-full by cash or by cashier's or traveler's check.

If the week is oversubscribed by March 13, a lottery will be held. Notification of acceptance or wait-list status will be e-mailed by March 21, followed by detailed information in early May.

All cancellations incur a minimum non-refundable \$30 fee. \$150 will be retained for cancellations received after April 26. \$400 will be retained for cancellations received after June 5. The entire registration fee will be retained for cancellations received after June 19. To protect your investment, you may wish to consider purchasing trip cancellation insurance.

Only full-time registrants will be accepted. Participants 15-17 years-old are welcome if accompanied by a responsible adult. Smoking is permitted in limited areas of the site; pets are not allowed on the campgrounds. For the health of all camp participants, please use fragrance-free personal hygiene products. Detailed information regarding products provided by BACDS, as well as those you might choose to bring yourself, will follow your acceptance.

Scholarships are available. Indicate your intention to apply on your registration form and submit the separate application posted on www.bacds.org/amweek.

> Although all campers will have light daily chores, the smooth operation of camp depends upon the efforts of Work-Trade campers. A limited number of Work-Trade positions are available at a total registration fee of \$554. All registrants are eligible and will be considered in order of application. Please submit a \$150 deposit with vour request.

>Thanks to the generosity of the Country Dance and Song Society and affiliate CDSS communities, three full-fee Youth Scholarships are available to campers ages 18-30 who actively demonstrate community leadership potential.

> A full tuition "Jude Biggs" Musician's Scholarship is available to a promising dance musician, one whose energies and inspiration at camp will contribute to dances in his or her local community.
