All these musicians are also great teachers known for their inclusiveness and high fun factor. Also teaching will be beloved callers Scott Higgs, Cis Hinkle, and Gaye Fifer (from the East, South, and Midwest!), and Matthew Duvenek, back for another round of teaching tango, waltz, and rowdy country dancing! There was one particularly rowdy and entertaining night last year – well, never mind, come and help us surpass last's year's follies. Matthew's partner, Anna Gilbert, will be sharing her creativity as an artist and craftswoman, as well.

So yes, the ingredients are all there – just add water, -er, campers to make an unforgettable week. Come join us, and you just might find the magic I've always found in the Mendocino Woodlands. Whether you want to study guitar, piano or fiddle, vocal improvisation, Tune writing, tango or waltz, or just hike in the woods and dance all night, it all works. ### **CDSS Lifetime Contribution Award Presented to Chuck Ward**

What recent Bay Area event featured 30 musicians onstage playing, 5 display teams dancing, the premiere of a newly composed brass fanfare, the recitation of at least one limerick, and a parting champagne toast? The description matches only one event: the presentation of the 2009 CDSS Lifetime Contribution Award to Chuck Ward, held on March 28, 2010, in Albany, California.

More than 200 people attended the ceremony, sponsored jointly by CDSS and by BACDS. The afternoon's Mistress of Ceremonies was Kalia Kliban, current programmer of the Sebastopol English Country dance co-founded by Lydee Scudder and Chuck; mass band leader and organizer of the day's music was Chuck's fellow North Bay pianist, Rebecca King. Guests included Derek Booth, Liz Dreisbach, Peter Persoff, and Stan Kramer, members of the Claremont Country Dance Band with whom Chuck recorded *Popular English Country Dances of the 17th and 18th Centuries* in the mid-1970's; Ellen Judson, daughter of caller Mary Judson who worked with Chuck during his early years in California; and Helene Cornelius, longtime Pinewoods staff member and senior teacher of CDS Boston Centre. Also represented in the program by their works were Chuck's friends Marshall Barron, who wrote several of the arrangements performed by the band, and Eric Leber, who choreographed the two-couple set "Chuck Ward's Whirl," performed by four nimble BACDS dancers.

After the spoken tributes, musical offerings, country dance demos and a spectacular rapper performance by Swords of Gridlock, CDSS Director Brad Foster and CDSS Board President Bruce Hamilton formally presented Chuck with his award, together with a commemorative tile designed by Nawal Motawi. CDSS Associate Director of Development, Robin Hayden, described the work of the Chuck Ward Musicians Training Fund, the CDSS Leadership Fund created in celebration of Chuck's many contributions to the dance community. There next followed a refreshments break, a time for friends to converse, admire the photographs and posters on the walls, write anecdotes or draw sketches at the scrapbook table, look over old flyers and ball booklets on display, or simply eat. Then it was time to dance.

Callers Alan Winston (CA), Alisa Dodson (MA), Brad Foster (MA), Brooke Friendly (OR), Bruce Hamilton (CA), Mary Devlin (OR), Robin Hayden (MA), Sharon Green (CA), and Tom Roby (CT) presented sets of favorite dances, which were interspersed with morris and sword demos by Apple Tree Morris, Berkeley Morris, Goat Hill Morris, and Leap of Faith. The program concluded with an exuberant mass dancing of the jig Princess Royal and Winster Processional out to the terrace, where the assemblage toasted Chuck, and Susan and Sarah Kramer led the group in singing Wild Mountain Thyme.

## Contra College: Contra Dance Teaching Retreat Weekend November 12-14, 2010

Many of us have had the experience of bringing a friend to a dance and having them not come back. They have been frustrated by the large number of dance steps and lack of teaching. Some of us analytical types struggled in the beginning with the lack of explicit instruction and the stressfulness of "picking it up as you go." Newer dancers sometimes express frustration at dance weekend workshops not really being workshops at all, but just a collection of dances with a common theme. Some of us have gone past beginner status to that of intermediate dancers only to get stuck at a plateau, having trouble making that shift into "advanced" dancer status. I personally have experienced all of these conditions, and for that reason, I have joined with Susan Petrick in organizing a new, different model of contra dance weekend.

Contra College will be held the weekend of November 12-14, 2010 at the gorgeous Sequoia Retreat Center, just north of Ben Lomond in the Santa Cruz Mountains. Susan Petrick will be the caller/teacher for the weekend, and a variety of local musicians led by Eric Anderson will provide us with very danceable tunes. Susan and I have worked out a curriculum that explicitly and carefully teaches contra dance steps in a way that allows dancers to build their skills slowly over the course of the weekend and internalize learned steps before adding in new ones. She will be doing more explaining than at regular dances and will provide more question-and-answer time. The dances will also be really, really fun, since the dancers will feel confident and at ease.

The venue is set on top of a ridge, giving beautiful views from the dance hall, while being tucked in among the redwood trees (see their website at <u>http://www.sequoiaretreatcenter.com</u>). Dancers will stay in cabins with three beds, in-room bathrooms (with showers), and central heating. The weekend will go from Friday after work (including dinner) to Sunday at 2:00 p.m.

If you are a new or intermediate dancer, consider attending and getting your diploma from Contra College! If you are an experienced dancer, please think about your friends who might benefit from this kind of an experience. There is space for a few experienced dancers interested in working with newcomers. Experienced participants can also work on developing additional skills (like learning the other gender role), discuss issues of outreach and retention of newcomers and help out while having fun. ### **From the President**



**From the President:** There's a lot going on right now in the dance community. Please take some time to get involved in what's going on, even if it's only by spreading the word.

**Youth:** The BACDS Board of Directors is getting younger. This month we elected two new Board members: Will Kruse, coming with ideas and experience from the time he served on the CDNY Board, and (Dalia) Yona Ran, the high school student who has

taken charge as "Food Diva" for the Palo Alto Contra. They join Cory Rundle and Mary Hill as representatives of the youth interest. The Berkeley Contra still seems to attract the most twenty-somethings, and the Palo Alto Contra seems to appeal to the *very* young. We recently had a just-short-of-seven-year-old young man there who impressed everybody with his poise, enthusiasm, and willingness to ask any woman to dance.

**Volunteers:** You all know that everything we do gets done because someone volunteers to do it. Please take the time to thank the people you see helping out, and try to remember that there are many more volunteers you can't see. You can be one, too. There's always room, even at the top. Both the Playford Ball Committee and the Spring Fling Committee are looking for someone to step into the committee chair role. Both committees are full of experienced people, including ex-chairs, who can help you run things, so it's not as daunting a task as you might think.

**Camps:** This is a mixed bag. English Week sold out in the first few weeks of registration, and Fall Frolick looks like it will also sell out quickly. Spring Fling is coming back. It actually made money this year, after crediting it with the funds from the Youth Scholarship program. This year, we forged some connections with the Southern California dance community that may help Spring Fling grow even more in the future. American Week and Family Week are still looking for more campers for this summer. The Board just approved additional youth and music scholarships for American Week.

**New initiatives:** Next fall, we will offer a new Contra dance *teaching* weekend, called Contra College. Joyce Fortune is managing this and Susan Petrick will be the programmer. We, along with TDOGS and NBCDS, are working on a proposal from the Queer Contra group to jointly sponsor a 12-hour contra dance in the Bay Area this spring. Talk to Mark Galipeau if you are interested in working on this. We'd like very much to sponsor a West Coast Youth Dance Weekend. If enough young people come to American Week, we'll start the planning there.

**Halls:** We're still on the lookout for new places to dance. So far, no one has found a place for us to re-establish the second Friday contra series. Grace North Church is undergoing renovations, so we've had to move the Berkeley dances temporarily. The new owner, Christ Church of Berkeley, is still happy to have us as tenants, but the damage to the roof and walls is serious enough to need immediate attention. The Mountain View English dance will be looking for a new hall in the fall, since Flex-It is closing. There are lots of opportunities for people to help us find new halls.

**Finances:** The recession continues. People have less to spend, and if they have jobs, are more reluctant to take time off for dance camps. We're coping with that, and still managing to dance around the financial break-even point. We could lose 10 or 20 thousand dollars this year if things don't get better, so continue to encourage your friends to come and dance with us, and especially encourage them to come to camps and weekends.
