# **Contra College: Contra Dance Teaching Retreat Weekend**

Many of us have had the experience of bringing a friend to a dance and having them not come back. They have been frustrated by the large number of dance steps and lack of teaching. Some of us analytical types struggled in the beginning with the lack of explicit instruction and the stressfulness of "picking it up as you go." Newer dancers sometimes express frustration at dance weekend workshops not really being workshops at all, but just a collection of dances with a common theme. Some of us have gone past beginner status to that of intermediate dancers and gotten stuck at a plateau, having trouble making that shift into "experienced" dancer status. I personally have experienced all of these conditions and for that reason I have joined with Susan Petrick in organizing a new, different model of contra dance weekend.

Contra College will be held the weekend of **November 12-14, 2010** at the gorgeous Sequoia Retreat Center, just north of Ben Lomond in the Santa Cruz Mountains. Susan Petrick will be the caller/teacher for the weekend and a variety of local musicians will provide us with very danceable tunes. Susan and I have worked out a curriculum that explicitly and carefully teaches the contra dance steps in a way that allows dancers to build their skills slowly over the course of the weekend and internalize learned steps before adding in new ones. She will be doing more explaining than at regular dances and we expect more question and answer time. The dances will also be really, really fun, since dancers will feel confident and at ease.

The venue is tucked in among the redwood trees at the top of a ridge, giving beautiful views from the dance hall (see their website at <u>http://www.sequoiaretreatcenter.com</u>). Dancers will stay in cabins with three beds, in-room bathrooms (with showers), and central heating. The weekend will go from Friday after work (including dinner) to Sunday at 2:00 p.m.

If you are a new or intermediate dancer, consider attending and getting your diploma from Contra College! If you are an experienced dancer, please think about your friends who might benefit from this kind of an experience. There is space for a few experienced dancers interested in working with newcomers. Experienced participants can also work on developing additional skills (like learning the other gender role), discuss issues of outreach and retention of newcomers, and help out while having fun. ### Quite a Song and Dance...

... is the subtitle and theme of the 16th BACDS Fall Ball. This year, our programmer (and long-time committee member) Ric Goldman is presenting a program that will include dances that have tunes that are also songs, as well as some songs that we also know as dances. The connection between English country dances and the song tradition is a strong one. Especially in the early days of Playford's Dancing Master collection, which was published in many editions over several decades starting in 1651, many of the dances were set to the tunes of well known songs.

Have you ever wondered where the whimsical and evocative names of some of the old dances come from? What about *Row Well, Ye Mariners, Upon a Summer's Day,* or *The Mayd Peept out at the Window* (alternately *The Friar in the Well*)? These names do not particularly relate to the movements or the structure of the dances, but rather to the names of popular songs of the day. Some of these songs have survived, more or less, to the present day – we're all familiar with Greensleeves – and others have been perpetuated as nursery rhymes or collected in anthologies of ballads. Here's one I remember from when I was a child:

If all the world were paper And all the sea were ink, If all the trees were bread and cheese What would we do for drink?

And so on for several verses of nonsensical hypothesis. Some of the songs were either overt or coded political messages; this was a time of civil war and religious polarization in England. Tunes, songs, ballads, and melodies for formal compositions were much more



interchangeable in those days, and people didn't have to worry about copyrights and royalties. It was only to be expected that these tunes would wind up being recycled for dances. Take *Greensleeves* for example. Having started off as a popular tune in Elizabeth I's time, it acquired various sets of words, one of which is the one that's most familiar today. The tune shows up in two different guises over several decades in Playford: as *Green-Sleeves and Pudding-Pies* and later as *Green Sleeves and Yellow Lace*.

As "country" dancing evolved through the 18th century, it became more gentrified and less connected to the people, so it lost some of its connection to popular tunes and songs. More dances and their accompanying tunes were composed by professional dancing masters. But in its modern revival, English country dancing has again often looked to the song tradition for its music and motivation. So we now have *Faithless Nancy Dawson* to the tune of *A-Roving*. We dance *Key to the Cellar* to the melody of a Jacobite ballad putting down the Hanoverians, and Pat Shaw's *Heidenröslein* (Heath Rose) picked up where Schubert and Goethe left off with the song. Perhaps things come full circle when an Elizabethan lute song, which may have been inspired by the dance rhythms of the day, becomes reinterpreted hundreds of years later as the dance *When Laura Smiles*. Dances and songs such as these will be an element of this year's ball.

Song has always been an important aspect of the Fall Ball over the years, and one tradition has been the informal gathering to sing just before the dancing starts. This group sing-along helps set the mood for the evening – whether you choose to sing along, to sit and listen, or to hear it in the background as you get ready to dance. We can expect the song circle this year to feature some of the same tunes that we will later be dancing to.

Our musicians for the evening include Shira Kammen, who is renowned for her combined instrumental and vocal prowess; Charlie Hancock, whose talent and sure touch on the piano will be much enjoyed by all; and Jim Oakden, an amazingly versatile multi-instrumentalist with both a strong musical sensibility and a sense of fun.

The Fall Ball is a relatively informal and relaxed event, which makes it a great first ball to attend if you have recently taken up English country dancing. We recommend going to a few of the local dance series in early fall to get some familiarity with the dances, and then attending the workshop on the afternoon of the ball, featuring a superb Peninsula team: caller Lise Dyckman with musicians Stanley and Susan Kramer plus Bill Jensen. This way, you will have the dances primed in your mind and your body ready for the evening. At a combined price of \$25 for the whole day (\$27 at the door), it's also a remarkable dancing bargain.



**From the President:** This summer has been an exciting time for many of our dance organizers. A lot has happened; some of it scary, some exhilarating, and some of it just intense.

*American Week* was the first scary thing. Coming into June, it was clear that the camp was not going to fill up with paying campers. Great staff, great program, great reputation

from previous years: but not enough campers. Could be the recession: people with enough time have been out of work long enough to be worried about money; people with money to spend often don't dare take time away from their jobs. Or something like that. We were looking at a potential loss of \$15-\$20,000. Scott Johnson asked the key question at the Board Meeting: if we're going to lose the money anyway, why shouldn't we expand our youth scholarship program and bring in a bunch of young people to liven up the camp and brainstorm about the future?

It worked. We filled the camp with young people, and they brought energy, enthusiasm, and ideas. Nearly everyone I've talked to said it was the best camp ever. And the young people are now part of next year's camp committee, helping us plan for the future. We did lose a lot of money (about \$18,000) but we consider it an investment in the future.

*English Week* and *Family Week* both made money this summer. *Family Week* is going strong. We're seeing many of the teen campers from prior years coming back as young adults and volunteering their time and energy in our dance community. And there's a new group of teens from this year's camp . . . They came to the Hayward Contra on the  $22^{nd}$ , and they were awesome.

This was our last summer at Mendocino Woodlands. *English Week* has been planning its move for over a year. They're going to Bishop's Ranch in Healdsburg. *American Week* made its decision this summer to move to Jones Gulch in La Honda. Both camps are closer to the Bay Area (and its airports), and offer more modern amenities. The cabins have electricity, and some have indoor plumbing. The camp staff cleans the bathrooms, so our work-trade volunteers can do more fulfilling things. And the terrain is flatter. We'll miss Mendocino, but the new camps have more potential for future growth.

And we had a scare over the *No Snow Ball*. Due to staff turnover at the Greek Orthodox Cathedral, we lost our reservation for the first Saturday in December. A small group of us put together a very intensive search for another hall. All the other halls that were big enough were already booked. So we finally settled on moving the Ball to another day. It will be on Sunday, December 5, and it will start and end an hour earlier than usual. Mark your calendars.

Once again, we nearly lost Spring Weekend. After putting together a very successful *Spring Fling* last March, the committee began to fade away, as the chair and programmer both decided to step down. The rest of the core committee came together over the summer, recruited a new chair (Peggy Chipkin), a new programmer (Sam Weiler), renamed the camp (*Spring Fever*), picked up some energy from the American Week youth contingent and the Balance the Bay committee, and is on track to bring us a weekend that is even better than last year's.

*Balance the Bay* was once again an outstanding success. The committee did an outstanding job: everything was well organized, and things that were problems last year were mostly fixed this year. We have a new list of things to fix for next year, and people are working on them. It was a fabulous party, and the quality of dancing was phenomenal.

It's been a wild ride, but a good one. I'm looking forward to seeing what happens next.
