Balance the Bay 2012: A Contra Dance Experience You Don't Want to Miss by Julie Thomas

Balance the Bay is hot bands and cool breezes, exciting dancing and enticing refreshments, friendly faces and fabulous fun. Make sure you're part of it **August 10 – 12 at the Janet Pomeroy Center in San Francisco**. This year, our programmer, Susan Petrick, has arranged for wonderful bands and callers: The Great Bear Trio, Joyride, George Marshall, and Bev Bernbaum are coming to San Francisco to help us create a contra dance extravaganza!

Registration opens March 1. You can register on line: go to <u>www.bacds.org/btb</u> and select "Registration" from the menu. Or you can fill out a printed registration form and mail it on March 1. Be forewarned: Last year's Balance the Bay was a sell-out, so the word in the contra community is "Register early!"



The **Great Bear Trio**, from central New York State, is a wonderful family ensemble of two brothers and their mom, making irresistible dance music on a wild variety of instruments. Kim Yerton, a classically trained pianist and piano teacher, holds the beat and provides a foundation from which her talented sons soar to imaginative heights on a variety of instruments. Both Andrew and Noah Van Norstrand play a wild variety of instruments, which allows them to infuse their original compositions and arrangements with surprising improvisations. So, don't be too startled when your dreamy dance trance is suddenly interrupted by an electric guitar solo or a digerido percussion. There *will* be a whoop and a holler.

Joyride is a contra dance band of friends from Portland, Oregon, playing for contra dances, dance camps, weekends, and festivals. Known for tight ensemble work, skilled play, fun energy, and inventively arranged tune sets, Joyride plays old and new dance tunes from New England, the British Isles, Appalachia, French Canada, and right here at home. George Penk's richly-danceable fiddle is joined by Erik Weberg's flute, harmonica, and bombarde, Sue Songer's lilting piano and Jeff Kerssen-Griep's ebullient guitar and percussion. Sue also joins George to drive twin fiddles.





George Marshall's specialty is teaching and calling the New England-style contra dances he has collected throughout the country. He is renowned for his knack of matching music to dance and for his smooth, concise teaching and presentation. Also a talented musician, he plays concertina and bodhran and has recorded on eight albums. You may know George from his work with other national touring bands, such as Wild Asparagus, Swallowtail, Nightingale, and several others. In addition to performing and teaching, George produces music and dance events including a week-long dance vacation in the Caribbean.

Bev Bernbaum, from Toronto, has been addicted to all things contra since she was first introduced to it at the Falcon Ridge

Folk Festival (Albany, NY) in 1996. Since then, Bev has been in demand as a regular caller in her home town of Toronto, and at other dances and dance weekends in Ontario and many points south of the border. Bev's philosophy is to call the dances that she likes to dance herself. She's always on the lookout for interesting figures or formations to mix things up. Her clear voice, calm manner, and straightforward teaching style make contra dancing a pleasure for both beginning and experienced dancers.

American Week – It's Not Just for Dancing Anymore

OF COURSE American Week is about dancing! With Carol Ormond and Nils Fredland doing contras and squares, and Eric Erhardt and Lori Pimental teaching couple dances, the dancing will be exciting and sublime.

But American Week is also about music.

This year, for the first time at a dance camp, the music offerings will reach full parity with the dancing opportunities. In addition to at least one music class during every period during the day, there will now be staff-led music sessions every night – during the evening dances. This will not detract from the dance experience at all; it will allow people who are more interested in performing music to enjoy the complete camp. If you have a spouse or friend who loves to play music, *this* is the camp for them.

In addition to helping musicians refine their general skills and techniques, the musical program will focus on how to play for *dances*. Playing for dances requires a specialized set of skills that aren't often taught. The American Week staff was hired specifically to fill this gap – in addition to being some of the most exciting dance musicians around, they're also some of the best instructors in the business.

Rodney Miller is the universally accepted grand master of New England fiddling (and was designated as such all the way back in 1983 by the National Endowment for the Arts). He's gotten better since then, having taught at hundreds of music and dance festivals, but he's not jaded, and still loves to sit around and play. His daughter Elvie Miller grew up steeped in the tradition, received a Thomas Watson Fellowship to travel the world studying the accordion, and is the current All Ireland champion backup musician. To say "She's good," is a huge understatement. Clyde Curley is a wonderful, down-to-earth teacher (he actually *was* a school teacher) and a walking tune encyclopedia, being the co-editor of the contra-tune bible *The Portland Collection*.

Then there is the Seattle Group... Dave Bartley and Clyde Ginsberg, who play with KGB and too many other groups to list, are both experts in a variety of genres, and excel at passing on their skills. Anita Anderson, known for her musician's intensive courses and inventive piano playing, is adept at explaining what she does to bring contra rhythms and chords to life. The ever-popular Avant Gardeners (Laura Light and George Paul) will use their amazing techniques and skills to make the campers' band an enjoyable learning experience for the musicians and an exuberant experience for the dancers. And George, composer of innumerable memorable tunes, will be teaching his craft in a tune-writing class. This class has been a big hit at camp for the last three years; it's become a tradition!

So pass the word to your musician friends: it's not necessary to go all the way to Fiddle Tunes to find the best musicians and instructors the contra world has to offer—they can come to American Week. We'll be jamming all night...

Musicians' Course at Hey Days English Dance and Music Week

BACDS Hey Days English Dance and Music Week presents an English Dance Musicians' Course with the fabulous Shira Kammen, August 19-26, 2012. Co-sponsored by the Country Dance and Song Society, this is an intensive opportunity to refine skills and get feedback from a master.

English dance music can use skills from a variety of musical backgrounds-contra, classical (especially chamber music), jazz, even choral part singing. This course will give you the tools to take what you already know and transform it into music that enhances English dancing. Regardless of the type of music you've been used to playing, if you have command of your instrument, can parse written music, and are willing to devote three hours a day to this effort for the week, you will emerge a better and more sensitive dance musician.

You will spend the whole morning with Shira. The course will contain practical musical theory, demonstrations, instruction in arranging, and intensive work in small groups, supervised and unsupervised.

After lunch you will take a class in English country dance—either one for advanced dancers or an ECD core curriculum class. Then you have your choice of another ECD class, a band workshop open to the whole camp, longsword, improv comedy, practicing on your own, or relaxing. Opportunities to play for dancers include the daily open mic session and Campers' Night.

The President's Corner



From the President: We had low expectations for the San Francisco Contra on Saturday, February 18, Presidents' Day Weekend. The westbound Bay Bridge was closed all weekend for construction, and we didn't expect a lot of East Bay folks to make the long detour north to the Golden Gate or south via San Mateo. We went south-about, ourselves, and had a gorgeously scenic trip up Skyline Boulevard. But we left early and took our time. Not many others did. The San Francisco Contra has been struggling to boost its attendance over the past year, and

has had some nights with fewer than 30 people on the floor. Tonight's dance featured Wildcat Canyon with Eric Black. Solid local talent, but probably not worth the extra hassle of sitting in traffic for twice as long as usual. We had low expectations. Would we get a dozen people? Sixteen?

It came to be 7:30, and a couple of guys wandered in and asked about the newcomers' lesson. Eric took them onto the floor, and I wandered off to the lavatory. When I came back, Eric was working with a circle of twenty or so, and a whole crowd is lined up at the door. By 8:00, the newcomers' group had over 40 people in it and the circle filled the room. Eric got us into two lines for the first dance, took us through the walk-through, and was huddled with Marty trying to figure out whether to go with recorded music when the band walked in (they had been stuck in traffic on the Golden Gate), sat down, and started playing right off. Like magic.

We couldn't ask for a more auspicious start. We were up to three lines by the second dance. The third was a circle mixer, and by the fourth, we had enough experienced dancers on the floor to absorb the newcomers smoothly, and it just got better from there. The band was in top form, and Eric tailored his program nicely to bring the newcomers up to speed and keep the old-timers interested. His only bobble was his choice for the very last dance of the evening, which was too complicated for our remaining brain cells. After two false starts, he tore up the card and called "Lady of the Lake."

Total attendance by the sign-in sheet was 72 people, and I counted that many on the floor before the break. Most of the newcomers stayed to the end, and at least 6 of them came back the next Friday for the STEAM dance.

What made the difference? Apparently, the word is getting out. The largest group of newcomers came with Arielle, who has celebrated her past several birthdays by taking a crowd of friends to the SF Contra. And at least one other group was a church social group (not St. Paul's) looking for a fun night out. There may have been another church group as well. But the key thing is that local people are finding the dance, and coming back to it

Let's continue spreading the word.
