Dance Photography at American Week

Workshops formed my sensibility as a photographer early on, when I was a student at the Sun Valley Center for the Arts in Idaho in the late 70's. I still draw on the lessons I learned from Sam Abell, over a decade ago, at the Santa Fe Workshops. I thought the pinnacle I would reach as a photographer was leading workshops myself and joining that august company. Little did I realize that I would find that fulfillment at a week-long contra dance camp.

How to Take Dance Photos that Don't Suck was the ambitious title I gave to a workshop I added to the 2012 BACDS American Week schedule (I'm on the planning committee). It seems everyone takes pictures at contra dances now, and I thought there might be some interest in how to improve the results.

I have a few ideas on how to take good dance photos, to the point that I'm self-publishing my second calendar of contra dance photos. That particular body of work appears destined to become my legacy as a photographer, if I acquire any degree of fame at all before I die. I've been photographing this subculture for over 25 years, which is as long as I've been a dancer.

I found out that I really like teaching. I'd never taught at this sustained level before, meeting every day for a week, and I had a blast. My students also had a blast, and they grew as photographers right before my eyes. I liked sharing what I know, and I liked supporting these budding documentarians and photographers, regardless of their skill levels when they came to the class. Mostly, I liked infecting them with my bias toward imagery, which I consider significantly more crucial than content.

But conveying how to exploit the technology you have, regardless of its limitations, to capture great dance pictures became a real focal point of the workshop. Two people shot with iPads, and four shot with their cellphones. I shot one night of dancing with my iPhone to demonstrate what was possible. There were just two DSLRs in the bunch; only one person knew what RAW capture meant.

So obviously, this was not a technical workshop; it was a "how to see" workshop. It was a "how to be conscious of the moment" workshop. The equipment didn't matter; this workshop was about finding the *image*. I started each session with a brief talk about an issue, which I extemporaneously based on students' questions and daily results, and then we looked at each other's work.

My biggest fear was that people would copy what I did, or become discouraged about not being able to get similar results. After the second day, I stopped using my own work for examples and turned to the students' photos for instruction and inspiration. As it turned out, I had no need to worry. What became illustrative for everyone was how individualistic their work was.

I believe that every photograph is, in some measure, a self-portrait. Beyond recording a memory, photographers respond to how their internal thoughts, feelings, and visions are reflected in the outside world, and the compelling drive for coherence is what drives technical and creative growth. This artistic drive certainly showed in the images we captured during the workshop, and everyone grew as an image maker. I am very excited about leading the Dance Photography workshop again this year at BACDS' American Week during the week of June 30 – July 5. Skill Building for Callers and Musicians

Callers with two or more years of experience can apply for an intensive workshop with Scott Higgs. Limited to twelve callers to provide individual attention, the course will cover finding materials, selecting dances for the flow of an evening, honing teaching skills, and using a microphone, among other topics. You will spend the entire morning with Scott and other members of the class. In addition to Scott's tips and examples, you will practice calling with a musician and receive coaching from Scott and feedback from peers.

Sharon Green will lead a beginning callers' workshop. This course is open to all and is designed for people with little or no calling experience.

We will have music workshops for all levels, including a band workshop and a slow jam. Special one-day workshops on individual instruments such as piano and recorder will give you concentrated instruction from our talented staff. All callers and musicians may participate in the daily Open Mic and at Campers Night. We also encourage callers and musicians to help create late-night dance and music parties. The Jude Biggs Scholarship supports a musician to attend Hey Days. Look on our website for more information.

We will have many chances for additional fun outside the workshop schedule, including pool parties, a plethora of late night dancing and jamming opportunities, and a daily Gathering featuring staff and camper performances, stories, jokes, and more. Last year we instituted a music track that was equal in number of classes to the dance track (including during the evening dances), and it was wildly successful. The sessions were incredibly fun, and they spurred the dancers to late-night explosions of merriment. They are designed to be inclusive, so you don't have to be a tune encyclopedia to join the fun. A very communal atmosphere results when half the camp alternates between playing and dancing. Styling with Bruce Hamilton – February 16, 2013

Bruce Hamilton has taught English and Scottish country dancing in the San Francisco Bay Area for many years. One of the country's most popular English dance leaders, he is featured at many festivals and summer dance camps each year. Lately he's been focusing on non-choreographic elements of English Country Dance (ECD): how to move well, how to be musical, how to recover from slips, how to be a good partner, body mechanics, and the social and mental aspects of dancing.

On Saturday, February 16, Bruce will share his knowledge with us in a special afternoon English dance styling workshop at St Mark's Episcopal Church in Palo Alto from 2 to 5 pm, with music by Bill Jensen and Stan Kramer. The cost of the workshop is \$15. Workshop attendees should have familiarity with the standard ECD figures, be able to do a dance of modest difficulty from a single walk-through, and be able to move quickly (or be willing to sit out the occasional dance requiring that).

I want to sponsor a dance for my birthday. How can I do it?

There have been a number of special birthday celebrations at BACDS dances in the past few years. Recently, Ellen Eagan and Bob Ashforth celebrated their birthdays at the San Francisco Contra. On January 26, Lynn Wilde will celebrate hers in Palo Alto. Each of these has a different flavor. Ellen's was a free dance: she paid everyone's admission and covered all the costs. Bob and Lynn helped arrange for the band and helped cover transportation costs: so there was still an admission charge at the door to pay the band. Other people celebrate their birthdays at our dances without giving us any notice at all: they just show up with their friends and family at a regular dance. That's as it should be. A birthday celebration is an individual thing, and you can arrange it the way that works best for you.

If you want to celebrate your birthday at a BACDS dance, and if you want to make special arrangements, get in touch with the programmer well ahead of time (5 to 6 months is a good lead time). If you want to arrange a special band or caller, you need that much time to get them on the calendar. Financial arrangements are flexible; you can pay for the whole think, or contribute to costs, depending on your resources and inclinations. Again, arranging in advance is preferred. Or you can just show up with your friends. If Jim Saxe gets wind of it, he may just run out and get a cake to serve at break.

The President's Corner



From the President: The recent passing of Vanessa Schnatmeier (see box, page 4) reminds us of the fragility of life and the value of each person. It also reminds me of how invisible some of our key volunteers can be. Vanessa has held a lot of key volunteer positions with BACDS over the years, but recently you seldom saw her on the dance floor. In her case, it was the progress of her illness that limited her mobility and therefore her dancing. She did keep dancing as long as she could, but her priority was her commitment to *Mad Molly* and the Morris circuit.

You don't have to be ill or at Death's door to be an invisible volunteer, however. Our dance community, as small and tight-knit as it is compared to the Bay Area as a whole, is fragmented in a number of ways. If you just attend your local dance series, or the dances on your side of the Bay; if you do English but not Contra or *vice versa*, or if you are strictly a Morris Dancer, you may never meet some of the people who are, have been, and will be instrumental in making your favorite dance happen.

Think about this from time to time. Notice the people who are helping run the dances and events you attend, remember to thank them, and think about the folks behind the scenes who are supporting them. Think about getting out to some other dance events (on the other side of the Bay, in another genre, or whatever) to meet some of the people you wouldn't ordinarily meet. Think about joining a dance or event committee to learn how things get done. Attend a quarterly mailing party. Do a term or two on the Board of whichever dance organization you are part of. BACDS is not the only game in town. There's a lot of crossover with TDOGS, NBCDS, BAERS, TSDC, MCDC, SCDS, Brassworks, and the Dickens and Renaissance Faire groups. Some key BACDS volunteers are actually more involved in our neighbor organizations than with BACDS stuff. Stacey Carr, co-programmer of the San Francisco Contra, is on the Board of the North Bay Country Dance Society. I'm betting a lot of BACDS folks who dance at the SF Contra regularly wouldn't recognize her.

And some jobs are just invisible by nature. The BACDS Archivist, for example, is responsible for making sure that meeting minutes and supporting documents are saved somewhere where they can be found when needed for legal purposes. Lise Dyckman's been doing that job for at least 10 years, but who would notice? This month she came to the Board meeting and persuaded us that since the minutes are all done online now, the Secretary is perfectly capable of saving them into an online folder that is indexed and backed up automatically. So her job got so invisible it went away. If you see Lise, remember to thank her. It was a valuable contribution in its time.

As Joyce Fortune likes to remind us at the Palo Alto Contra, it takes a village to raise a dance. Dance, then, enjoy yourself, enjoy the company, and remember that life is precious and that you get out of it what you put into it. Happy Holidays to all of you.
