Meet Award-Winning Pianist Jacqueline Schwab on Saturday, July 27th

On Saturday, July 27th, BACDS dancers and musicians will have three separate opportunities to enjoy the talents of Jacqueline Schwab, a folk and classical improvisational pianist who plays "gorgeously spare piano" (The Boston Globe) yet "sounds as if she has an orchestra at her fingertips" (Sing Out). A founding member of the



band *Bare Necessities*, Jacqueline will lead a special workshop for English country dance musicians (12:00 noon to 2:30pm; pre-registration required); conduct her workshop musicians in an English country dance for all (3:00-5:00pm, with caller David Newitt); and both call and play for the Fourth Saturday experienced English dance that night (7:30-10:30pm), where she will be joined by Anne Goess on violin and Judy Linsenberg on recorders. All three events will take place at Christ Church, 2138 Cedar Street, Berkeley.

Musicians interested in applying for Jacqueline's workshop should contact Sharon Green, 510-654-7974, *sharongreen@post.harvard.edu*. Class size is limited; preference will be given to active BACDS dance band musicians seeking to improve their skills. Scholarship aid is available for those unable to afford the \$30 tuition fee.

Jacqueline is an inspiring and inspired performer, whose accomplishments are known nationwide. Chosen by the renowned Ken Burns for numerous public television documentaries due to the emotional expression in her playing, she has performed on the soundtracks for the Grammy award-winning *Civil War*, for the Emmy award-winning *Baseball* and for *Mark Twain*, among others. In 1997 she performed at the White House for President Clinton to celebrate Burns' *Lewis and Clark* series and also in 2000 at the Smithsonian to celebrate its exhibition on the Presidency. In May, 2009, she accompanied Scottish singer Jean Redpath, on the *Late Show* with David Letterman. BACDS is fortunate to have her with us for the day.

BACDS Fall Ball welcomes Los Angeles dance leader Annie Laskey

Save the date Saturday 16th November for a special day and night of dancing — the 19th annual BACDS Fall Ball! This year, we are excited to have Annie Laskey from Southern California as our programmer and caller. Annie is a mainstay of the dance community in the LA area, where she co-founded and runs Culver City English Country Dance, now in its eighth year. She is no stranger to the Bay Area English dance scene either, having brought her dancing energy and sense of fun to the floor at past Bay Area balls and other events. We're very happy to have her here to lead the Fall Ball and to share her love of dancing with us.

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Annie Laskey first encountered English Country Dancing at Southern Renaissance Pleasure Faire back in 1979, when she apprenticed to one of the dance groups. Losing sight of dance for many years, she found ECD again in 2000 (after a couple of years' flirtation with Scottish Country Dancing) and soon after became an ECD caller, then a dance producer. As a CDSS Board member from 2005-2008, she danced in communities from Arkansas to Oregon. Her favorite out of town calling gig so far (although we hope to be a new favorite) has been as shipboard dance leader for Ken McFarland's 2011 trip along the Dalmatian coast of Croatia. For her day job, she runs a walking tour program of historic architecture in downtown Los Angeles.

The Bay Area enjoys an extraordinary quality and diversity of English dance musicians, and *Bangers and Mash* is one of the leading and original bands. The band is well known through their performances at dance events, as well as in their anchor role as the house band at Fezziwig's Warehouse, a role which they have performed with gusto at the San Francisco Dickens Fair for many years. You likely know musicians Craig Johnson (piano/ keyboards), Stanley Kramer (violin), Susan Kramer (woodwinds etc.) and David Strong (viola and violin) from their individual playing at Bay Area dances, but when they combine their talents, they bring a unique blend of elegance and liveliness to any dance. This will be their Fall Ball debut as *Bangers and Mash* and we're looking forward to hearing their musical interpretation of Annie's programme.

The day's events on the 16th begin with an afternoon workshop to review the Ball programme. It is followed by a dinner break, while the hall closes to be dressed in its evening finery. We regroup for the special evening that is the Fall Ball itself, and afterwards, we enjoy the afterglow of the dance together at our community potluck.

Of course, putting on an event such as this takes the effort of many people working together. We're looking for Ball lovers to join in and help put the event on, either by being on the organizing committee or as a volunteer on the day. You don't need to have any particular experience or dancing background — rather enthusiasm is the thing — and being a volunteer or joining the committee can be a great way of getting more involved in the community. Anglo-Irish Hi-jinks At Fall Frolic!

Fall weekend program directors Kalia Kliban and Sharon Green are pleased to announce the stellar staff of this October's *Fall Frolick*. Featuring three nationally—even internationally—known teachers of English country dancing and two dynamic performer-teachers of display dance, the October 18-20 weekend at Monte Toyon Conference Center in Aptos offers dancers and musicians opportunities to focus on a single interest or to explore a wide variety of sessions on traditional dance and song.

Leading the English country dance program are the Bay Area's Bruce Hamilton, renowned as a teacher of teachers and as a proponent of vigorous, energetic dancing; Philadelphia's Jenny Beer, perhaps best-known for choreographing the hit dance *Key to the Cellar*, but also known for her extensive work bringing country dancing to college students; and Amherst's Graham Christian, choreographer and reconstructor, whose witty "Tell Me More" columns about the origins of English dances have enlivened many issues of the CDSS News.

Display dancers have a major treat in store this year, as rapper and longsword wizard Ted Hodapp and prizewinning Irish step dancer Maldon Meehan bring their expertise to the *Frolick*. Ted, the leader of the Washington DC performance group Cutting Edge Sword, choreographs and performs dynamic, high energy showpieces for events ranging from Morris and Sword Ales to the Washington Christmas Revels, while Portland-based Maldon performs, teaches, and choreographs Irish *sean-nos* and set dances in both the Pacific Northwest and Ireland. Exciting videos featuring Ted and Maldon in performance can be found on YouTube: just search for *Cutting Edge Sword*, or for Maldon Meehan.

Once again *Fall Frolick* showcases some of the Bay Area's finest musicians—Charlie Hancock on piano and accordion; Rebecca King on piano and clarinet; Shira Kammen and Michelle Levy on violin and vielle—and teams them up with great bandmates with whom they don't usually get to play. This year's visiting musical stars are Seattle's Dave Bartley (guitar, mandolin, cittern, etc.) and ex-*Cirque du Soleil* wind instrumentalist Wayne Hankin, playing far too many instruments to name. Joining them as song leader is *Oak, Ash & Thorn's* Doug Olsen, a perennial favorite. Providing crystal-clear sound for the weekend is longtime sound guru Nick Cuccia.

And you're afraid that a week-long camp would be too much to take? Relax! There's plenty of time for relaxing, napping, walking in the woods, and still all the dance and music sessions you want. You'll be refreshed and rejuvenated after camp, rather than tired and worn out.

There are still some spaces left for this week-long dance adventure. Boost your contra dancing to the next level; hike in the redwoods; make new friends! Can't picture dancing non-stop for a week? There are also crafts classes, singing, dance band workshops, and time and space to just chill.

The organizers and staff of American Dance and Music Week invite you to share great food, laughter galore, amazing stories and songs, and top-notch dancing and music. Built in the 1930's on the site of an old lumber camp, the camp features heated cabins nestled in the redwood forest with modern bathrooms and showers. Tent camping is available, too.

American Dance and Music Week: We Refinished the Floor at Perkins!



For the past two years, American Week campers have enjoyed Perkins Lodge as the focal point for many activities. It worked well for daytime workshops and after-dance parties. There were numerous favorable comments about the community centered around the crafts, games, music, food, all happening at the same time with everyone all together in the same place for the late-night partying.

Unfortunately, the Perkins floor was not up to our standards for serious dancing. It was rough and sticky, kind of like dancing on cement or on grass. It was hard to dance smoothly. Twirling was almost completely out of the question. So we had to trek across camp to the Dining hall for the evening dances.

Having everyone in the same room is a Very Big Plus.

At the 2012 camp, *American Week* managers Eric Black and Diane Zingale proposed that BACDS should donate materials and labor to the camp to refinish the floor and make it more suitable for dancing, and to have that done for camp in 2013. The management of Jones Gulch camp accepted this proposal and was very supportive.

On two days during the Christmas holiday season, a work crew of 10 volunteers led by Marty Brenneis sanded, countersunk nails, replaced crumbling sections, and cleaned the floor. Then we applied a total of 8 coats of a durable modern sealer and finish which is designed to stand up to muddy boots during the winter and still have a smooth surface for dancing.

The floor is still the same funky particle-board tile, so it's not beautiful to look at. But the surface is nice and smooth, and it's better for dancing than many of the floors in "regular" dance halls used for Contra Dancing around the country.

Recently, Diane & Eric went back to see how the refinished floor had weathered a winter of muddy boots worn by youngsters attending CA Environmental Education classes (a mandated part of the CA curriculum; yayy!). The floor shows some scuffing, but that will be fixed by a "refresh" buffing before camp starts.

Eric reports: In dance shoes, I took a 2-step [short] running start, and nicely slid 2 feet on the floor. Swinging, waltzing, and twirling are very nice. It's not sticky, yet it's not too slick so you have to worry about falling or pulling muscles. And the wooden structure of the building has a nice 'give', which is kind to the joints and muscles." **Check it out this summer!**

The President's Corner



From the President: This Memorial Day weekend was a quiet one for our local contra dances. With so many people away at Folklife in Seattle, Folk Madness in New Mexico, and Camp Sturtevant in the Sierra Madre, there weren't many people at the Friday night San Francisco Contra when we showed up. Manager Maria Markoff gave us a big smile when she saw us come in with our pan of brownies (don't forget to contribute to pot-luck snacks if you can). It was a small crowd, but a warm and friendly one, and the music by *The Rosin Doctors* just lifted us and carried us away. It was one of the most enjoyable

dances I've been to recently. The newcomers came up to speed quickly; they were twirling away like regulars by the end of the dance. Maria told me we'd have had more dancers if some of the early-arrivers who looked in the door and turned around when they saw so few people had just had *a little* more faith. Even though it is small right now, the SFdance is doing an excellent job of bringing in newcomers, *and* persuading some of them to come back. It's worth losing money on a dance if we gain new dancers by it. Saturday's Palo Alto Contra was also smaller than usual. Although in this case I mean two lines instead of three and only about 80 people. It's nice to see this dance doing so well. For those who don't remember 4 or 5 years back, Palo Alto was struggling just as San Francisco is today. In this case, we had an extra attendance boost: a carload of dancers from Monterey who came with Elizabeth Miranda, who was playing *in Three Fifths of Scotch*. We brought brownies to this dance, too, and slightly improved the recipe (more cinnamon, less wheat germ).

And the Hayward Contra took the weekend off. Too many organizers were going to be elsewhere, so I heard. We can't mention the Hayward dance without sending a big *Thank You* to Karen Fontana for all the work she has done creating, organizing, and supporting this dance. When Karen was looking to start a new dance series back in 2007, she decided to set up her own organization instead of joining BACDS. This allowed her to try new ideas and do things her way without a lot of people looking over her shoulder and saying, "but that's not how *we* do things." The Hayward Contra was a great success from the start. Karen built her own organization, the *Traditional Dancers of the Golden State* (TDOGS) to run it. Karen put a lot of energy and drive into the Hayward dance, and made it a model that other dance series have been able to learn from. Indeed, she almost single-handedly revived the pot-luck snack table concept by heavily investing in her own contributions. Our other contra dance series are still not up to the Hayward dance's standard of snack tables (although the Palo Alto *English* dance meets or exceeds it). After six years, Karen is stepping down from actively programming the Hayward Contra, and handing it off to others in the TDOGS organization. Thank you, Karen.

There was one no-show at the Palo Alto Contra who was not missed. One of our long-time, but very occasional, dancers has been battling with mental illness over the years. We want our dances to be a welcoming and friendly place, where you can put aside your troubles and just dance and have a good time. We're willing to welcome almost anybody, even if they seem a bit strange, as long as they can respect other people and act or talk in a way that frightens them. This particular dancer crossed over that line and entered into a one-sided conversation with a woman dancer involving explicit sexual language and implicit threats of violence. The BACDS Board voted to ban him from all of our future dances. We haven't actually been able to serve notice to him, since he's apparently been threatening others, including the police, and is currently in the county jail.

I mention this here because I want you to know that the BACDS Board is very concerned with making sure our dances are safe, friendly, and welcoming. We have a policy in place to investigate accusations of inappropriate behavior, and where necessary, deal with it by warnings, interventions, or outright bans.

The BACDS "Social Contract" (**bacds.org/organization/board/policies/social contract**) is mildly worded, but we take it seriously. We've had to ban three people in the 11 years I've been on the Board. Please do report anything unusual or scary to your dance manager or to the BACDS Board. Try to call attention to the problem or ask for help as soon as possible, even if it means leaving the dance or getting up from sitting at the sign-in table. Most of the time, it will turn out to be some sort of misunderstanding, but it's better to be sure. The Boston Marathon bombings have reminded us all that no place can ever be truly safe, unless we pay attention.
