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Mindful Dancing

Contra dancing is a practice in mindfulness; the mindfulness of movement. When I listen to the music and let it tell me the current move and when to switch to the next, when my body just twirls and spins to those directions, all is well in the world (or at least in the dance line). When I think about the washing I have to do the next day or a work problem or that there's a faint smell of body odor and I wonder whose it is or that I want to dance with the cute blond guy in the next line, then I mess up (and mess up other couples). All goes wrong in the hall for a few long minutes till I go back to listening to the music and letting my body do the dancing.

What could be better than that? Precious little. Yes, I'm one of those who also practices meditation (for a contained number of minutes), sitting in a chair with my eyes closed, following my breathing, trying to let my thoughts come and pass like clouds in the sky. Honestly, I'd rather be dancing.

Actually, there are very few things I'd rather do than contra dance. There's something magical about this "practice." It doesn't look so fabulous (doesn't shimmer and shine like Tango, for example), but it *feels* phenomenal. I remember one Saturday night during a contra dance weekend, after a few hours of twirling on the dance floor, my current partner swung me around and whispered, "Do you see how stoned everyone is?" And he was right! It was incredible. We were a hall full of human beings high on life—specifically on the dopamine of dance: twirling and grinning and stomping and jumping.

I work as a psychotherapist, devoting many hours of my workweek helping depressed patients in a hospital program. It's rewarding work, and it's hard. I have to recharge on the weekends, to follow self-care (as we always stress to our patients). And contra dancing is a major part of my self-care. It's a time when I am in my body and out of my head. I've just decided it's a need, not a want.

In this lovely dance, men often dance the traditional male roles and women the traditional female roles. Just as often, men dance the traditional female roles and women the male roles. Or, non cis-gender folks dance either or both roles. All (or some) of the folks in the lines switch roles mid-dance or between dances. All genders dress in loose clothing with sturdy dance shoes—often in swirly skirts and flowy dresses. It is, in the proverbial usage, "all good." Who cares. There's live music (how cool is that?). There's exciting calling, there's speed, there's touch. All that matters is right there in the hall: music, movement, relating, swinging, flirting, and the wondrous feeling of being fully alive. All grins and no frowns... that's the world of contra.

I take it back: we all shimmer when we're on the floor!

Korean and English signs point the way, past the sandy, tangled community garden, surf close, and salt air fresh, the side door opens wide welcoming, streaming golden warmth into the night. I enter the spare church meeting hall that doubles as neighborhood basketball court, floor polish scuffed away, well loved. Shy and anxious, some friends and I, children grown, tired of screens, have come to try contra dancing. On the small, cluttered stage, musicians and caller tune their instruments, fiddles, flutes, guitar, and a microphone. The assembled dancers are a motley crew of wiry, kilted, gray-bearded men, friendly, strong young amazons, ordinary kind people I pass on the street, "Will you dance with me?" "Thank you, yes, (delighted) I am a beginner...it is my first night." We line up in rows facing partners, name buttons gleaming. nodding, smiling, we prepare to stomp. The music careens as bodies, arms, legs swirl around me. A physical pattern emerges with repetition, guiding hands and charmed music. Intellect is of no use. Can't pull to the side and re-read the guidebook. Listen to the caller, no time to dither. The walls and my partners are dizzying blurs. Out of my body and very in my body, confident hand-offs send me on, and I turn blindly, knowing someone will be there for me, thrilling that they are. I spin, stamp, whirl, and twirl. My two, new, titanium hips smooth and willing, a full skirt, ocean blue, and my periwinkle canvas slippers, the blue suede shoes of a dancing fairy tale. A sprig of church garden rosemary carries the joy home, till I return to dance again.

The President's Corner



From the President: It's time to talk about the "G" word. The term "gypsy" has a long history in the Contra and English dance communities to refer to a move where two people dance around each other face to face. For many of us it evokes a stereotypical romantic picture of flirtatious exotic dancers, and even the "Gypsy Davey" of folk ballads. For others, it has a far darker meaning. The Romany peoples of Europe, who were misidentified as "Egyptians" in the middle ages (hence the term "Gypsy"), are subject to much the same kind of discrimination Europe as African-Americans have suffered here, and in many

Eastern and Central European languages, the native equivalent of the "G" word carries the same kind of nasty connotations that we associate here with the "N" word.

There has been a lot of discussion in recent years in the dance community about whether we can come up with a replacement name for the dance move that does not carry the same cultural baggage, and even more discussion about how much cultural baggage there is in the first place. This topic first came to my attention with a flurry of posts to the English Country Dance mailing list in February of 2016. I am sure these postings were not the first, but it shows that the debate has been going on for about a year and a half. It also quickly became clear that the discussion originated more from a sense of concern about using a term that might be offensive than from a specific complaint by the potentially offended group. Yes, once the discussion got going, people did ask the Romany community how they felt about it, and got mixed responses. This past month, the discussion reappeared on the ECD mailing list, with many people ready to dive into arguments that had already been aired the year before. It is worth directly quoting what Alan Winston, in his role as list moderator, posted in response to this resurgence:

Over the last couple of years I've probably spent 20 hours in (mostly online) discussion about the G-word, and I'm really tired of it. Just in the interest of saving time and angst, I'm going:

- PLEASE, nobody post any variation of "This is political correctness gone mad!" I think it's up to the conscience of each individual caller whether they want to use the term or not, and up to each series organizer whether they care about whether the caller uses it or not.
- PLEASE, let's not have a discussion about whether it's a slur if it's not meant as a slur, and if people see Bohemianism, free-spiritedness, or dressing like Stevie Nicks as positive values associated with it. (In addition: there exist a bunch of Rom people who don't want to be called gypsies, and there exist at least some Rom people who don't mind it or even like it, and there are some travelling people who aren't Rom who would rather be called gypsy than Rom. It's complicated. Can we take that as read?)
- PLEASE, let's not have a discussion about whether the word originates from somewhere else and doesn't even refer to an ethnic or lifestyle choice. (I know someone who's constructed an etymology where it comes from a Welsh word for "gaze". Doesn't help. We know what "niggardly" means, it's a perfectly fine word, but it's subject to misinterpretation and maybe it's better to consider your audience.) It's not helpful to run after people saying the equivalent of "you're only offended because you're ignorant!" Even if it's true.

So yes, this is an important topic for thought and discussion, and no, there is no consensus or even a clear picture of how much this matters to the people who have the most right to be offended. This is a period where we are all becoming aware of the possibility that a term that is deeply embedded in our dance tradition might be seen as offensive, we are exploring the issue and experimenting with alternatives, but there still needs to be lots of thought and experimentation before we reach a new consensus. And we should not rush to conclusions. The person who shouted "Please use another term" when the caller said "gypsy" at a recent Contra dance was overreaching. That kind of shout-out puts the caller on the defensive, pre-empts the decision-making power of the dance management committee, and is unanswerable by the community without stopping the dance for a protracted discussion. There is a lot of sorting out yet to do before a consensus is reached, and it is too soon to be shouting down one side or the other.
